

FILM 4 DOCUMENTARY




The film, based on Mark Goodman's story, will tell a heart-wrenching story of unimaginable abuse, isolation, and loneliness. Though we will follow Mark's character through some of the darkest times of his life, this story is not all doom and gloom. It's a road to redemption for both Mark and his father, sprinkled with light-hearted, endearing moments that invite all audiences to care.

During the production of the movie, we will film a "behind the scenes" style documentary. This documentary more explicitly delivers the real-life emotion of giving and receiving the grace of Christ. We will interview and explore the characters on which the film is based, including family, friends, and those directly involved in the project. Throughout the narrative of the documentary, the audience will experience the raw, authentic journey of meeting Christ.

Fundamentally, we see Mark Goodman's story as a platform to tell non-believers about Jesus. We believe this story will shine a light into the darkness, and help people encounter Christ and forgiveness.

THE CHARACTERS





THE BACKSTORY

"I've eaten from dumpsters, and I've dined with kings," Mark Goodman says, "but neither is all that satisfying." In Forgiving a Good Man, Mark shares how his journey from homelessness to the height of success was overshadowed by abuse and its aftermath until he found freedom through forgiveness.

Mark's honest journey began in Detroit, Michigan, where he was raised in an alcoholic, abusive home with his three older brothers—Jim, Bob, and Mike. Mark's formative years were marked by **shouting voices**, **flying fists**, **and sexual abuse behind closed doors**. After graduation from high school, and a brief stint in an automotive factory, Mark and his brother Mike tore a path to California. There, they lived homeless on the streets and beaches around Los Angeles for a year. For reasons he didn't yet understand, Mark eventually decided to return home. He stuck out his thumb in California and picked up what he thought to be an otherwise routine ride from a cowboy heading to Cheyenne, Wyoming. Mark soon discovered the perils of hitchhiking. That evening, he was sexually assaulted by the cowboy, a fact Mark buried for years.

Mark stuffed this new shame down alongside his abusive past and tried to focus on the future. But the longer he ignored his pain, the more he saw the products of unforgiveness around him. His eldest brother Jim, struggling with anger, isolated himself from the entire family. His brother Mike, diagnosed with schizophrenia, refused his meds because a clear mind allowed the memories to flow. His brother Bob, the closest thing Mark had to a mentor, called him from a transmission shop at four in the morning, slurring a confession that he could never be free of the pain his father had inflicted. Mark woke the following morning to the news that Bob's intoxication on their call was from the carbon monoxide of a car running in the garage. Bob had taken his own life.

Despite the dysfunction and death all around him, Mark looked forward. He built a successful software company, ignoring his bitterness, his brothers' issues, and the cowboy from Cheyenne. But through all of this he recognized that he too was still carrying around the pain, shame and blame from his past. There he was, confronted with its mandate to forgive others without condition. Growing in this practice, Mark found himself able to release those who'd hurt him. The relief brought him the very thing he'd been chasing all along—utter freedom.

In an increasingly polarized world in which so many feel the sting of shame, blame, and abuse, the path to forgiveness is complicated at best. According to the Center for Disease Control, one-quarter of all Americans have suffered from neglect or physical, sexual, or mental abuse. Those who've never experienced abuse have suffered the pain, shame, and blame of life in other ways. Consider the large number of marriages that end in nasty divorces. Consider those who've suffered from violent crimes. Consider the everyday outrages, arguments, and bullying people experience in the workplace or on social media. We've all been used or abused by others in some way.

The path to freedom-thru-forgiveness is a road less traveled; this much is true. But few stories are more inspirational than one of uncharacteristic, extravagant forgiveness told by one who's experienced the worst pains and injustices of life. There's something about these stories stir us to live better stories, to drop our disdain and differences and dream again. Mark's story delivers this kind of provoking, liberating effect.

He leads the viewer into the poignant experience of a deeply wounded victim forgiving his worst offenders and uncovering an astonishing treasure—complete freedom. Viewers of this raw and poetic memoir will learn how forgiveness short-circuits the vicious cycles of abuse, anger, and self-harm, and ultimately opens the door to the most unlikely kind of reconciliation.

Mark's honest, hopeful journey is a story in which we can all find ourselves. Who hasn't been wronged by someone close? Who hasn't been offended or betrayed? We've all experienced firsthand—even more so these days—the distinct pain that relationships and human interactions can bring. Far fewer of us have experienced the astonishing freedom that comes when the inner pain is replaced by an outpouring of inexplicable grace and love. Forgiving a Good Man offers this much-needed promise for today's tension- and hurt-filled world.
